2025 Greatrace



If you enjoy driving your antique vehicle, start your engine and get recognized for driving your AACA approved vehicles throughout the calendar year with the Mileage Award Program (MAP). Participation is voluntary and tracking mileage is your responsibility.

Any time a vehicle is driven - anywhere for any reason - the mileage counts towards the award level. Once you sign up, you will receive a badge and awards at 2,000 and 5,000 and each 5,000 mile increment thereafter. The cost to become a MAP member is a one-time fee of \$25.

1939 Buick Roadmaster Indianapolis 500 Pace Car

Buick's motorsports history includes two NASCAR titles and six Indianapolis 500 pace cars

Just three 1939 Roadmaster Indianapolis 500 pace cars were built. The cars were based on the rare Roadmaster convertible "80C," according to an auction report by R.M. Sothebys. Each car was presented in the "Indy 500 Livery" of the period-

popular colors of creamy yellow with gold lettering outlined in black.

The red interior featured an elaborate, painted wood-grain dash in red and red leather upholstery. The Indy 500 treatment also included a black parade tonneau and a cloth top with boot.

Among the features in the Indy 500 package were dual side-mount spare tires and an accessory spotlight at the base of the driver-side windshield, though neither feature is shown in this marketing photo.

Buick History

Buick was on a roll in 1939 with innovative advertising and promotion. Sales were soaring and there had been a host of product improvements, according to the 2011 auction report.

Buick boss Harlow Curtice was determined to set a new sales record. To stimulate sales, the 1939 Buick Roadmaster Indianapolis 500 pace car was created. It


was based on the rare Roadmaster Convertible Sedan. A new sales target of 200,000 cars was set and at the dealer's kickoff meeting an airplane was displayed on stage with the number "200,000" painted on its wings. The campaign was successful as Buick sold more than 208,000 cars. The result solidified Buick's

position as No. 4 in the industry, behind only the Big Three.

R.M. Sothebys auctioned a 1939 Roadmaster Indianapolis 500 pace car at its 2011 Hershey, Pa., event. The car sold for \$62,500.





Tonka: The First Truck You Ever Drove

Before we ever touched a real steering wheel, many of us were behind the dump bed of a Tonka truck. Heavy. Steel. Built to last. Tonkas weren't just toys—they were our first connection to machines, design, and speed.

These trucks weren't plastic or flimsy. TTonka trucks were made of pressed steel, bolted together like Detroit's finest. The yellow paint was thick, baked on like enamel. The moving parts weren't for show, they were functional. Dump beds tilted. Cranes spun. Cabs rattled down the sidewalk with real weight. For kids growing up in the golden era of muscle cars, Tonka was the only thing in the toybox that felt like a machine, not a prop.

Most of my Tonkas weren't just played with, they were raced. As kids, we turned the hill by our house into our own personal drag strip. We'd sit on top of our dump trucks, fire engines, and Jeeps, gripping the sides, knees tucked in, and let gravity do the rest. No helmets, no brakes, just bare knees, steel wheels, and pure adrenaline. We rode them hard until we were too skinned up to continue, the trucks dented and dusty but still rolling strong. My jeep sure could roll better than the rest of them. Looking

back, it wasn't just play it was our first taste of speed, competition, and the thrill of the ride.

Tonka came out of Minnesota, from a company that once made garden tools. But these trucks were clearly built by people who loved real machines. The designs copied full-size rigs from the '50s and '60s, with bold fenders and grilles like classic GMCs. They were made to survive—and they did.


A lot of collectors still have an old Tonka tucked in the garage, maybe dented and dusty, maybe missing a wheel—but still tough, and still cool. For car lovers, Tonkas hit the same notes: solid build, real design, and a story behind every scratch.

You'll see them at car shows and swap meets now, sometimes in the trunk of a classic. People smile, point, and say, "I had one of those." They bring back memories—and remind us where our love of cars started.

So next time you head to a show, throw a Tonka in the back seat. It just might be the thing that gets the most attention.
